

DR. GILBERT ROZMAN
Professor, Princeton University

Dr. Gilbert Rozman is a professor at Princeton University and this year is a Woodrow Wilson International Center Scholar. He also serves as an Associate of the National Intelligence Council since 2006 and a Senior Fellow at the Foreign Policy Research Institute since 1998. He has taught at Princeton University for the past forty years, and from 2008 to 2010, he served as the director of the Princeton Institute of International and Regional Studies project on East Asian National Identities.



Recent research has focused on the interactions of four regional powers and the two Korean states, resulting in a five-book series on strategic thinking in Northeast Asia. Earlier work focused on regionalism, and ongoing research centers on comparisons of national identities and their impact on bilateral relations. Publications include: *Chinese Strategic Thought toward Asia*, 2010 (Palgrave); *Strategic Thinking about the Korean Nuclear Crisis: Four Countries Caught between North Korea and the United States*, updated paperback edition, 2011 (Palgrave); *U.S. Leadership, History, and Bilateral Relations in Northeast Asia*, 2011 (Cambridge University Press), and *East Asian National Identities: Commonalities and Differences*, forthcoming (Woodrow Wilson Center Press). He conducts research in Chinese, Russian, Japanese, and Korean and graduated with a B.A. in Chinese and Russian Studies from Carleton College and a Ph.D. in Sociology from Princeton University.
