



Crystal Chang, Ph.D., Lecturer, University of California, Berkeley

Dr. Chang is a Lecturer in the Department of Political Science and the International & Area Studies Academic Program at the University of California, Berkeley. She teaches a range of undergraduate courses on the political, economic, and social history of East and South Asia. Prior to arriving at UC Berkeley, she was a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Walter H. Shorenstein Asia-Pacific Research Center. In addition to UC Berkeley, she has also taught at San Francisco State University, Mills College, Dominican University of California, and the College of Marin.

Her current research focuses on the role of industrial policy and foreign direct investment in the development of the Chinese auto industry, which is now the largest in the world. Her work seeks to understand how the Chinese auto industry has been shaped by the fragmentation of regional production networks, as well as how emergent Chinese automakers will influence the competitive dynamics of the global auto industry, especially the market for electric vehicles. She conducted field work in China for this project with funding from the UC Pacific Rim Research Program. Some of her findings were published in *The Third Globalization: Can Wealthy Nations Stay Rich in the Twenty-First Century*, edited by John Zysman and Dan Breznitz and published by Oxford University Press.

Prior to her career in academia, Dr. Chang worked in the venture capital and information technology industries in Silicon Valley and Shanghai, China, respectively. In those positions, she helped to build relationships between businesses with operations in California, Taiwan, and China. Dr. Chang holds degrees from UC Berkeley, UC San Diego, and Stanford University.
