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Kristine Lee is an Associate Fellow with the Asia-Pacific Security Program at the Center for a New American Security (CNAS), where her research focuses on U.S.-China relations, U.S. alliances and partnerships in the Indo-Pacific region, and managing the North Korean nuclear threat. Lee was a recipient of a Fulbright fellowship and received her Bachelor of Arts in History and Literature with a language citation in Mandarin Chinese from Harvard College, where she was the Editor-in-Chief of the *Harvard International Review*. She earned her Master in Public Policy from the Harvard Kennedy School, focusing on international relations and security studies. Her writing has appeared in *Foreign Affairs* online, *Politico Magazine*, *War on the Rocks*, *Foreign Policy*, *The Hill*, *USA Today*, *The National Interest*, and various CNAS publications, and she has provided commentary to *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, *The Los Angeles Times*, CNN, BBC, Al Jazeera, Voice of America, among other news outlets. In June 2019, Lee was named as a 2019-2020 recipient of the ILT Andrew J. Bacevich Jr., USA Award.

She has recently authored or co-authored several popular pieces exploring different aspects of China's involvement in the UN.
