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Oriana Skylar Mastro is a center fellow at Stanford University's Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies, where her research focuses on Chinese military and security policy, war termination, and coercive diplomacy. Dr. Mastro is also a resident scholar at the American Enterprise Institute where she is working on a book about China's challenge to U.S. primacy. She continues to serve in the United States Air Force Reserve as a Senior China Analyst at the Pentagon. For her contributions to U.S. strategy in Asia, Dr. Mastro won the Individual Reservist of the Year Award in 2016. She has published widely, including in *Foreign Affairs*, *International Security*, *International Studies Review*, *Journal of Strategic Studies*, *The Washington Quarterly*, *The National Interest*, *Survival*, and *Asian Security*, and is the author of *The Costs of Conversation: Obstacles to Peace Talks in Wartime*, (Cornell University Press, 2019).
