

Ling Chen, Ph.D.

Assistant Professor of Political Economy, School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University



Ling Chen is an Assistant Professor of Political Economy at the School of Advanced International Studies at Johns Hopkins University. She is also affiliated with the Fairbank Center for Chinese Studies at Harvard University as an Associate in Research. She has been selected as a 2021-2022 Wilson China Fellow by the Woodrow Wilson Center. Before joining SAIS, she was a Shorenstein Postdoctoral Fellow at Stanford University and a Rajawali Fellow at the Ash Center of Harvard Kennedy School.

Chen studies state-business relations, as well as economic, tax, and industrial policies in China. Her work has been accepted by or published in journals such as *American Journal of Political Science*, *The China Journal*, *Politics & Society*, and *World Development*. She is the author of *Manipulating Globalization: The Influence of Bureaucrats on Business in China* (Stanford University Press, 2018). Chen's research has been funded by institutions such as the Social Science Research Council (Andrew Mellon Foundation), Chiang Ching-Kuo Foundation, and Stanford University. She was recognized as an NCID Diversity Scholar by the University of Michigan and was the winner of the Catalyst Award at Johns Hopkins. In addition to academic outlets, Chen has also published in *The Washington Post* and *Axios*. Her comments have been quoted, among others, by *Foreign Affairs*, *Foreign Policy*, and National Committee on US-China Relations.
