Jacquelyn Schneider is a Hoover Fellow at the Hoover Institution. Her research focuses on the intersection of technology, national security, and political psychology with a special interest in cybersecurity, unmanned technologies, and Northeast Asia. She is a nonresident fellow at the Naval War College's Cyber and Innovation Policy Institute and served as a senior policy advisor to the Cyberspace Solarium Commission.

Schneider was included in CyberScoop's Leet List of influential cyber experts in 2018. She is also the recipient of a Minerva grant on autonomy, a Stanton Foundation grant for wargaming cyber-nuclear implications, and a University of Denver grant to study public responses to the use of drones (with Macdonald). She is working on a book, *The Rise of Unmanned Technologies*, and has published in numerous academic journals and media outlets.

Schneider previously held positions at the Center for a New American Security and the RAND Corporation. Before beginning her academic career, she spent six years as an Air Force officer in South Korea and Japan. She is currently a reservist assigned to Space Systems Command. She has a BA from Columbia University, an MA from Arizona State University, and a PhD from George Washington University
