Vivienne Bath is Professor of Chinese and International Business Law and Associate Director International of the Centre for Asian and Pacific Law, Sydney Law School. She is also a Senior Research Fellow of the Asia IP and Technology Law Project at the University of California, Berkeley, School of Law. Her teaching and research interests are in Chinese law (with a focus on investment, both inbound and outbound, and China’s approach to private and public international law), international business and economic law and private international law. She has first class honours in Chinese and in law from the Australian National University, and an LLM from Harvard Law School. She has also studied in China and Germany. She is qualified to practice law in Australia, New York, England and Hong Kong, and, prior to joining the University of Sydney in 2005, she was a partner of Coudert Brothers, where she specialized in Chinese law and business. She spent 20 years in legal practice in Hong Kong/China, New York and Sydney, specialising in international commercial law, with a focus on foreign investment and commercial transactions in China and the Asian region.
