

Jason Hsu, Senior Fellow, Hudson Institute



Jason Hsu is a senior fellow at Hudson Institute, where he focuses on the United States' technological cooperation with allies and partners as well as Indo-Pacific security and U.S.-China and Taiwan relations.

From 2016 to 2020, Mr. Hsu served as legislator-at-large in Taiwan's Legislative Yuan (the national parliament) where he focused on defense, technology, trade, and foreign policy. Previously, he was an Edward Mason Fellow at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government. He was also a visiting scholar at the Paul Tsai China Center at Yale Law School where he led a research team in designing a war game on a Taiwan Strait blockade contingency focused on gray-zone warfare.

Mr. Hsu has lectured widely at colleges and universities, including the University of Toronto, University of California San Diego, IE University, Oxford, the US Naval War College, SAIS Johns Hopkins, Tufts, Yale University, the Columbia University School of International and Public Affairs, University of California Berkeley, and Stanford University.

Mr. Hsu was a recipient of the Eisenhower Fellowship in 2022 and was a Draper Hills Summer Fellow at Stanford University's Center for Democracy Development and Rule of Law. He was a fellow of the US State Department's International Visitor Leadership Program in 2019.

Mr. Hsu received an MPA from the Harvard Kennedy School of Government and a BA from National Chengchi University.
