From 1968-1973, Mr. Wolff was a lawyer dealing with international monetary, trade and development issues at the Treasury Department during the period that Paul Volcker was Under Secretary for Monetary Affairs.

Mr. Wolff is recognized in Chambers USA - America's Leading Lawyers and Chambers Global for International Trade: Trade Remedies & Trade Policy and is recognized in Best Lawyers in America 2009 as a leader in the field of International Trade and Finance Law.
