Michael Auslin is concurrently a Resident Scholar in Asian Studies and the Director of Japan Studies at the [American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research](#) in Washington, D.C. He is also a columnist for the [Wall Street Journal](#), writing about Asia and global security. He specializes in U.S. defense and foreign policy, security and political relations in the Indo-Pacific region, and global airpower and maritime issues.

Dr. Auslin was Associate Professor of History at Yale University prior to joining AEI. He also has been a visiting professor at the University of Tokyo. He received the Nakasone Yasuhiro Award for Excellence in 2010, and has been named a Young Global Leader by the World Economic Forum, a Marshall Memorial Fellow by the German Marshall Fund, and an Asia 21 Fellow by the Asia Society, in addition to being a former Fulbright and Japan Foundation Scholar.

Dr. Auslin is a prolific author and his books include the new release, [Pacific Cosmopolitans: A Cultural History of U.S.-Japan Relations](#) (Harvard University Press, 2011). In addition to his *Wall Street Journal* column, his writing appears in leading publications and he comments regularly for U.S. and foreign broadcast media. He is currently writing a book entitled *Pivotal: What Asia's Rise Means for America's Future*. He received a BSc from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service and his PhD in History from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.
