

Andrew S. Erickson, Ph.D.

## Professor of Strategy, China Maritime Studies Institute, U.S. Naval War College

Dr. Andrew S. Erickson is Professor of Strategy in, and a core founding member of, the <u>U.S. Naval War</u> <u>College</u> (NWC)'s <u>China Maritime Studies Institute</u> (CMSI). He helped to establish CMSI and to stand it up officially in 2006, and has subsequently played an integral role in its development. Erickson currently serves on the *Naval War College Review*'s Editorial Board. Since 2008 he has been an <u>Associate in Research</u> at Harvard University's <u>John King Fairbank Center for Chinese Studies</u>. Erickson is also an <u>expert</u> <u>contributor</u> to the *Wall Street Journal*'s <u>China Real Time Report</u> (中国实时报), for which he has authored or coauthored thirty-seven articles.

Erickson has presented extensively at academic, private sector, and government institutions throughout the United States and Asia. He has briefed a broad array of senior policy-makers and principals, including the U.S. Chief of Naval Operations, his Executive Panel, the Secretary of the Navy, and U.S. naval leadership throughout the Asia-Pacific; as well as the Deputy Secretary of Defense, other Executive Branch officials, and multiple Members of Congress. He testifies periodically before such congressional bodies as the <u>House Foreign Affairs Committee</u>, <u>House Armed Services Committee</u>, and U.S.-China Economic and Security Review Commission. Erickson has provided inputs for, and reviews of, multifarious government programs, simulation exercises, and reports; including in support of the National Intelligence Council's *Global Trends* study.

Erickson received his Ph.D. and M.A. in international relations and comparative politics from <u>Princeton</u> <u>University</u> and graduated *magna cum laude* from <u>Amherst College</u> with a B.A. in history and political science. He studied Mandarin in the <u>Princeton in Beijing</u> program at Beijing Normal University's College of Chinese Language and Culture; and Japanese language, politics, and economics in the year-long <u>Associated Kyoto Program</u> at Doshisha University. Erickson previously worked for Science Applications International Corporation (SAIC) as a Chinese translator and technical analyst. He gained early experience working briefly at the U.S. Embassy in Beijing, the U.S. Consulate in Hong Kong, the U.S. Senate, and the White House. Proficient in Mandarin Chinese and conversant in Japanese, he has traveled extensively in Asia and has lived in China, Japan, and Korea.

Erickson's research—which focuses on Asia-Pacific defense, international relations, technology, and resource issues—has been published widely in English- and Chinese-language edited volumes and in such peer-reviewed journals as *International Security* (forthcoming), *China Quarterly, Journal of Contemporary China, Asian Security, Journal of Strategic Studies, Orbis, Asia Policy, and Acta Astronautica.* It has also appeared in *Foreign Affairs, The Washington Quarterly, The National Interest, Foreign Policy, Joint Force Quarterly, IHS Jane's, Geopolitics of Energy, Global Health* 

Governance, RSIS Commentary, IISS Strategic Dossier (forthcoming), and Peking University's China International Strategy Review (Chinese- and English-language editions) and International & Strategic Studies Report. Erickson has published annotated translations of several Chinese articles on maritime strategy. His coauthored Foreign Affairs.com article, "The Danger of China's 'New Type of Great-Power Relations' Slogan," has been read widely in U.S. and Asian policy circles. Erickson's National Interest article "China Reveals Two 'Carrier-Killer' Missiles" received more than 65,000 page views in its first 24 hours online. His RealClearDefense piece "What Sort of Navy America Needs" registered 60,000 page views in its first day online. Erickson's publications have won a variety of awards, including the NWC Foundation Capt. Hugh G. Nott Prize (first place). Erickson has published op-eds with CBS and the Asahi Shimbun (Japanese- and English-language editions), and has appeared on CNN, C-SPAN, CCTV, NHK, Al Jazeera, Voice of America, Bloomberg TV, Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC), National Public Radio, and The John Batchelor Show.

Erickson is the author of the book Chinese Anti-Ship Ballistic Missile Development (Jamestown Foundation, 2013). He is coauthor of two other books: Gulf of Aden Anti-Piracy and China's Maritime Commons Presence (Jamestown, 2015; available from Brookings Institution Press) and Assessing China's Cruise Missile Ambitions (National Defense University Press, 2014). He has coauthored three additional volumes: Charting China's International Security Activism(Center for a New American Security, 2015) and the CMSI monographs Chinese Antipiracy Operations in the Gulf of Aden (2013) and Chinese Mine Warfare (2009). Erickson is the editor of, and a contributor to, two volumes: *Chinese Naval Shipbuilding:* An Ambitious and Uncertain Course (Naval Institute Press, 2016) and Proceedings of the 47th History Symposium of the International Academy of Astronautics (Univelt, 2015). He is coeditor of, and a contributor to, eight volumes. This includes five volumes in the six-volume Naval Institute Press book series, "Studies in Chinese Maritime Development," for which he is the series editor; comprising (before Chinese Naval Shipbuilding) Chinese Aerospace Power (2011), China, the U.S., and 21st Century Sea Power (2010), China Goes to Sea (2009), China's Energy Strategy (2008), and China's Future Nuclear Submarine Force (2007); as well as Basing and Forward Presence in the Asia-Pacific (Naval Institute Press, 2014), the CMSI volume China's Near Seas Combat Capabilities (2014), and the NWC Newport Paper China's Nuclear Force Modernization (2005).

Dr. Erickson testified before the Commission in 2014.
