Graham Webster is a senior fellow with Yale Law School's Paul Tsai China Center and a China Digital Economy fellow with New America, where he is coordinating editor of the DigiChina project. At Yale he leads programming on digital technology and U.S.–China relations, and from 2012 to 2017 he was responsible for the center's U.S.–China Track 2 and Track 1.5 dialogues on a wide range of security and economic issues.

At New America he coordinates the collaborative DigiChina project to translate, contextualize, and analyze Chinese digital policy documents and commentary. He was a 2017 fellow with the Transatlantic Digital Debates project of the Global Public Policy Institute (GPPi) and New America, and he writes the independent Transpacifica e-mail newsletter. In the past, he wrote a CNET News blog on technology and society from Beijing, worked at the Center for American Progress, and taught East Asian politics at NYU's Center for Global Affairs.

Graham holds a master's degree in East Asian studies from Harvard University and a bachelor's degree in journalism from Northwestern University. He is based in Oakland, California.
