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Joseph Fewsmith is Professor of International Relations and Political Science at Boston University. He is the author or editor of seven books, including, most recently (January 2013), *The Logic and Limits of Political Reform in China* (Cambridge University Press). Other works include *China since Tiananmen* (2nd edition, 2008) and *China Today, China Tomorrow* (2010). Other books include *Elite Politics in Contemporary China* (Armonk, NY: M.E. Sharpe, 2001), *The Dilemmas of Reform in China: Political Conflict and Economic Debate* (Armonk, NY: M.E. Sharpe, 1994), and *Party, State, and Local Elites in Republican China: Merchant Organizations and Politics in Shanghai, 1890-1930* (Honolulu: University of Hawaii Press, 1985). He is one of the seven regular contributors to the *China Leadership Monitor*, a quarterly web publication analyzing current developments in China. In addition, his articles have frequently appeared in such journals as *Current History*, *The China Quarterly*, and *Asian Survey*, and he has contributed chapters to such edited volumes as Elizabeth J. Perry and Sebastian Heilmann, ed., *Mao's Invisible Hand*, and Brantly Womack, ed., *China's Rise in Historical Perspective*. He travels to China regularly and is active in the Association for Asian Studies and the American Political Science Association. He is an associate of the John King Fairbank Center for East Asian Studies at Harvard University and the Pardee Center for the Study of the Longer Range Future at Boston University.
