Dr. Catherine Lotrionte is Visiting Assistant Professor of Government and Foreign Service and Director of the Institute for Law, Science and Global Security at Georgetown University. Dr. Lotrionte is also the director of Georgetown's Cyber Project, which focuses on the role of international and domestic law in emerging cyber technology and cyber threats.

Dr. Lotrionte previously served as assistant general counsel at the Central Intelligence Agency and Counsel to the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board. In 2002 Dr. Lotrionte was appointed by General Brent Scowcroft to serve as Counsel to the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board at the White House—a position she held until 2006. In 2002 Dr. Lotrionte served as a legal counsel for the Joint Inquiry Committee of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence. Prior to that, Dr. Lotrionte was Assistant General Counsel with the Office of General Counsel at the Central Intelligence Agency, where she provided legal advice relating to information warfare, foreign intelligence and counterintelligence activities, and international terrorism. Before working in the Office of General Counsel at the Central Intelligence Agency, Dr. Lotrionte served in the U.S. Department of Justice.

Dr. Lotrionte earned her Ph.D. from Georgetown University and her J.D. from New York University. She is the author of numerous publications, including a forthcoming book concerning U.S. national security law in the post-Cold War era. Dr. Lotrionte is a frequent speaker at cyber conferences held by academic, military, government, and media organizations, and is a Life Member of the Council on Foreign Relations.
