

Dr. Oriana Skylar Mastro Assistant Professor, Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service, Georgetown University

Oriana Skylar Mastro is an assistant professor of security studies at the Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University where her research addresses critical questions at the intersection of interstate conflict, great power relations, and the challenges of rising powers with a focus on China and East Asian security. Dr. Mastro is also a resident scholar at the American Enterprise Institute where she is working on a book about China's challenge to U.S. primacy. She continues to serve in the United States Air Force Reserve for which she works as a Senior China Analyst at the Pentagon. For her contributions to U.S. strategy in Asia, Dr. Mastro won the Individual Reservist of the Year Award in 2016. She has published widely, including in *Foreign Affairs, International Security, International Studies Review, Journal of Strategic Studies, The Washington Quarterly, The National Interest, Survival,* and Asian Security, and is the author of The Costs of Conversation: Obstacles to Peace Talks in Wartime, (Cornell University Press, 2019). Previously, Dr. Mastro was a Stanton Nuclear Security Fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations, fellow in the Asia-Pacific Security program at the Center for a New American Security, and a University of Virginia Miller Center National Fellow. She holds a B.A. in East Asian Studies from Stanford University and an M.A. and Ph.D. in Politics from Princeton University.
