



Dr. Wentong Zheng, Associate Professor, University of Florida Levin College of Law

Dr. Zheng is an associate professor of law at the University of Florida Levin College of Law, where he teaches international business transactions, international trade law, and other business law courses. Prior to joining the University of Florida in 2011, he served as an associate professor of law at The State University of New York at Buffalo Law School and an associate attorney at the Washington, DC, office of Steptoe & Johnson LLP.

His research areas include international trade, antitrust and competition policy, international intellectual property, Chinese law and economy, law and economics, and commercial law. He has written extensively on state capitalism and state-owned enterprises in China, including a chapter on institutional reforms for China's state-owned enterprises in the 2015 book *Regulating the Visible Hand? The Institutional Implications of Chinese State Capitalism*, and an article titled "Beyond Ownership: State Capitalism and the Chinese Firm," published in the *Georgetown Law Journal* in 2015. His recent publications have additionally appeared in the *Journal of Competition Law and Economics*, *Antitrust Law Journal*, *Stanford Journal of International Law*, *Berkeley Journal of International Law*, and *University of Pennsylvania Journal of International Law*, among many others.

Dr. Zheng earned his J.D. and Ph.D. in economics from Stanford University in 2005, where he was an executive editor of *Stanford Law Review*. He earned his B.A. and M.A. in economics from Renmin University of China.
