

Tobias Harris Economy, Trade, and Business Fellow, Sasakawa Peace Foundation USA

Mr. Tobias Harris is the Fellow for Economy, Trade, and Business at Sasakawa Peace Foundation USA. He is also an analyst of Japanese politics and economics at Teneo Intelligence, a political risk advisory firm.

Mr. Harris has written about Japanese politics for publications including the *Financial Times*, *Wall Street Journal*, and *Foreign Affairs* and regularly provides on-air analysis for CNBC, Bloomberg, and other networks. In 2006-2007, Mr. Harris worked on the staff of Keiichiro Asao, at that time a member of the upper house of the Japanese Diet and shadow foreign minister for the Democratic Party of Japan, for whom he conducted research on foreign policy and Japan's relations with the United States. He earned an MPhil in International Relations from the University of Cambridge and a bachelor's degree in Politics and History from Brandeis University.

Questions for Panelist

- 1. How have countries in the region and beyond responded to BRI? How has Japan responded to BRI? How do perceptions of BRI vary among different stakeholders in Japan (e.g., political elites vs. business elites vs. public opinion)?
- 2. How has BRI influenced the economic strategies of countries in the region?
- 3. How does BRI interact with other regional economic initiatives? To what extent can we expect BRI to compete with or complement development strategies envisioned by Japan?
- 4. To what extent do regional countries perceive BRI to impact or complicate their own national security interests? How, if at all, are regional countries recalculating or recalibrating their regional strategies in response?
- 5. Five years in, has BRI generally improved or hurt China's reputation and standing in the world? How has BRI extended China's diplomatic reach and soft power?
- 6. To what extent does China's growing influence affect or displace the U.S. role in countries hosting BRI projects?
- 7. The Commission is mandated to make policy recommendations to Congress based on its hearings and other research. What are your recommendations for Congressional action related to the topic of your testimony?
